

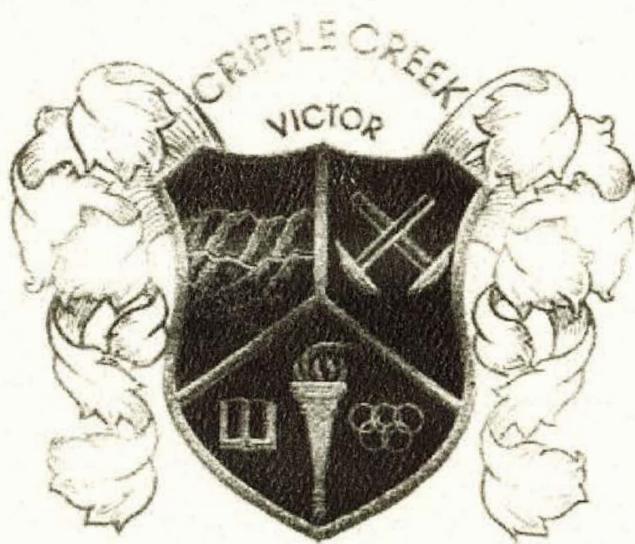

#1 Strategic Plan- Plan for framing the mission, core values and prioritized focus areas for CCVSD

High expectations for student performance, academically and behaviorally, alongside intentional instructional practices continues to be our focus area for all students and teachers regardless of the grade level or content area they teach. Collaboration with our partners (The New Teacher Project & 2 Partner Mathematics) drives us to know and understand the data through classroom walkthroughs and strategic goal setting. This has not been an easy process because change typically isn't easy but it is understood that while we cannot control everything, there is plenty within our control that needs to be strengthened.

#2 Building Partnerships- Build respect, cooperation, and assistance from parents and community

The National Family Engagement Summit offered some ideas on how to engage families who have traditionally been disengaged in their child's education/school. Interesting enough, much of the conversation centered around the classroom teacher and how they are truly the "door" to our families. One session offered data that showed that for some students/families, the only contact they received from school was from administrators (because of behavior issues) and had never heard from their child's teacher(s). Bottom line- relationships and ***proactive*** communication. Too often our families hear from us AFTER something has already happened- after the behavior incident, after the absences have piled up, after the grade has been given. But we are lax in communicating with families before these things occur. That being said, I am starting small by asking the staff to send a postcard home to every student/family in the district before the end of the school year that offers a kind word about their child and an upcoming event like report cards, testing, school event, etc.

#3 Student Engagement- Explore, offer and support innovative opportunities for all students

On Thursday, October 24th, I am headed to Beaver Creek, CO for the Regional Rural Housing Forum. During this forum, I will learn what other school districts have done to increase employee housing options and I will be able to connect with the housing and finance experts who have helped these school districts get it done! Reps from Eagle County SD, RBC Capital, Roaring Fork Habitat for Humanity, CRSA Housing, CHFA, Rural Homes Initiative/Paradox Trust and other rural housing specialists will be in attendance to provide answers, support and opportunities.

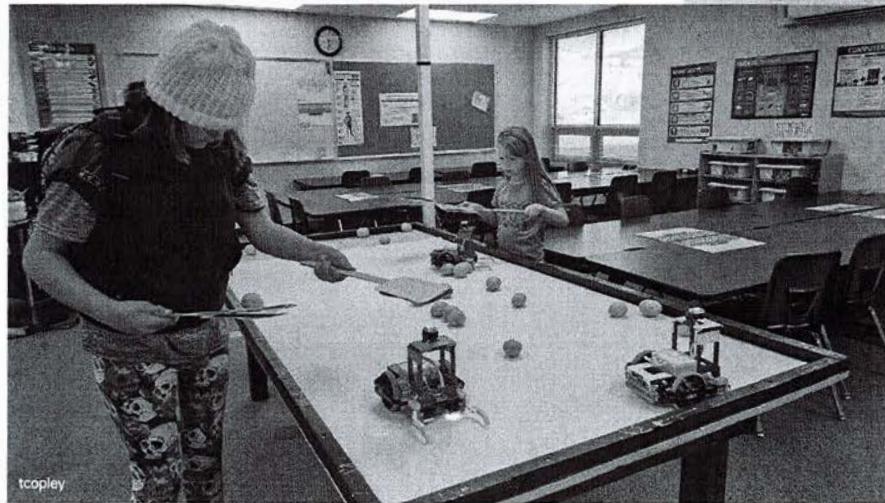

Principal's Perspective

November 2024

Cresson Elementary School is gearing up for Halloween as we roll through the fall season. We have parties and parades planned, so make sure to check with your child's teacher for more information on the festivities. We have the dates and times listed in our upcoming events section, and please take note that we have Parent Conferences scheduled for Tuesday, November 5th. Monday, November 4th is a work day to allow teachers time to prepare. Students do not attend school on either November 4th or 5th. Remember, you can always log into InfiniteCampus – Check your student's grade, attendance, and information. Please contact Technology Department if new to the District and need an activation key to sign up for the Campus Parent Portal Login.

We have parties and parades planned, so make sure to check with your child's teacher for more information on the festivities.

New Math???: What's with that, and what was wrong with how we learned Math?

The answer is that we do our best until we learn better practices and then we do better practices. Has your child ever come home with math work that doesn't make any sense to you because the text is asking your child to do the work differently than how you learned it? The world has changed and there is so much information at our fingertips. We need to change how we teach Math, especially number sense. Students need a solid foundational understanding of how numbers relate to each other and whether or not an answer is reasonable. After all, it would really stink to work and work, but not have a great grasp of number sense and how much money should be in your bank account, wouldn't it?

Our teachers are spending time every month learning how the brain learns math and the best practices for teaching.

Would you like to know how to help your child? Let's begin by understanding what exactly we're asking students to do. Each month I'll focus on a different grade level and give you details about that area's standard's content, expected benchmarks, and grade level expectations. Mathematics - Adopted 2020 - has 4 common standards across the grade levels:

1. Number and Quantity
2. Algebra and Functions
3. Data, Statistics, and Probability
4. Geometry

So far, we've seen kindergarten and first grade Number and Quantity standards. **This month we'll look at Standard 1 for Second Grade Mathematics this month.**

The first standard is: *Standard 1. Number and Quantity*

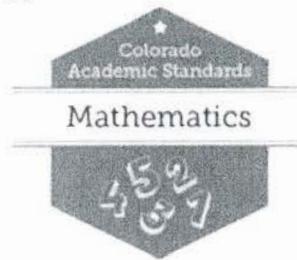
Wow! In Kindergarten there were four, in First Grade there are three, but in Second Grade there are only two Prepared Graduate statements just for Standard 1:

1. Prepared Graduates:

MP2. Reason abstractly and quantitatively.
MP7. Look for and make use of structure.

Grade Level Expectation:

2.NBT.A. Number & Operations in Base Ten: Understand place value..



Evidence Outcomes

Students Can:

1. Understand that the three digits of a three-digit number represent amounts of hundreds, tens, and ones; e.g., 706 equals 7 hundreds, 0 tens, and 6 ones. Understand the following as special cases: (CCSS: 2.NBT.A.1)
 - a. 100 can be thought of as a bundle of ten tens — called a “hundred.” (CCSS: 2.NBT.A.1.a)
 - b. The numbers 100, 200, 300, 400, 500, 600, 700, 800, 900 refer to one, two, three, four, five, six, seven, eight, or nine hundreds (and 0 tens and 0 ones). (CCSS: 2.NBT.A.1.b)
2. Count within 1000; skip-count by 5s, 10s, and 100s. (CCSS: 2.NBT.A.2)
3. Read and write numbers to 1000 using base-ten numerals, number names, and expanded form. (CCSS: 2.NBT.A.3)
4. Compare two three-digit numbers based on meanings of the hundreds, tens, and ones digits, using $>$, $=$, and $<$ symbols to record the results of comparisons. (CCSS: 2.NBT.A.4)

Academic Context and Connections

Colorado Essential Skills and Mathematical Practices:

1. Abstract 10 ones into a single conceptual object called a ten and abstract 100 ones or 10 tens into a single conceptual object called a hundred. (MP2)
2. Compose, decompose, and compare three-digit numbers according to their base-ten structure. (MP7)

Inquiry Questions:

1. How many hundreds are in the number “four hundred five”? How do you know? How many tens are in the number “four hundred five”? How do you know?
2. How many times do you need to skip count by 5s to count as far as skip counting by 10s once?
3. How many times do you need to skip count by 10s to count as far as skip counting by 100 once?
4. Why is any two-digit number that starts with 5 always larger than a two digit number that starts with 3?

2. Prepared Graduates:

MP1. Make sense of problems and persevere in solving them.
MP7. Look for and make use of structure.



Grade Level Expectation:

2.NBT.B. Number & Operations in Base Ten: Use place value understanding and properties of operations to add and subtract.

Evidence Outcomes

Students Can:

5. Fluently add and subtract within 100 using strategies based on place value, properties of operations, and/or the relationship between addition and subtraction. (CCSS: 2.NBT.B.5)
6. Add up to four two-digit numbers using strategies based on place value and properties of operations. (CCSS: 2.NBT.B.6)
7. Add and subtract within 1000, using concrete models or drawings and strategies based on place value, properties of operations, and/or the relationship between addition and subtraction; relate the strategy to a written method. Understand that in adding or subtracting three-digit numbers, one adds or subtracts hundreds and hundreds, tens and tens, ones and ones; and sometimes it is necessary to compose or decompose tens or hundreds. (CCSS: 2.NBT.B.7)
8. Mentally add 10 or 100 to a given number 100–900, and mentally subtract 10 or 100 from a given number 100–900. (CCSS: 2.NBT.B.8)
9. Explain why addition and subtraction strategies work, using place value and the properties of operations. (Explanations may be supported by drawings or objects.) (CCSS: 2.NBT.B.9)

Academic Context and Connections

Colorado Essential Skills and Mathematical Practices:

1. Relate concrete or mental strategies for adding and subtracting within 100 to a written method. (Entrepreneurial Skills: Critical Thinking/Problem Solving)
2. Make sense of place value by modeling quantities with drawings or equations. (MP1)
3. Use the base-ten structure to add and subtract, composing and decomposing ones, tens, and hundreds as necessary. (MP7)

Inquiry Questions:

1. Why might it be helpful to view subtraction as an unknown addend problem? (e.g., $278+?=425$)
2. How might you rewrite $38 + 47 + 93 + 62$ to make it easier to solve? How do you know it is OK to rewrite it?

Notice how the expectations and inquiry questions are getting more and more complex and abstract as we build through the grades! To help your child, take a look at these benchmarks. You can help by looking at the Students Can statements, Essential Skills, and Inquiry Questions. You can go online and look at the benchmarks and skills for the other three kindergarten standards.

Technology Board Report - November 4, 2024

Primary Activities

- Replaced 5 broken screens on student Chromebooks.
- Configured and temporarily installed cellular gateway for cameras in busses to connect to cell towers. Trial failed, gateway could not connect long enough on each bus route to allow time for camera footage to upload to the cloud. Since the trial failed I will be returning the gateways back to Verkada at no cost to us. We will go back to the way we had it before where camera footage if needed will be downloaded off the physical camera itself.

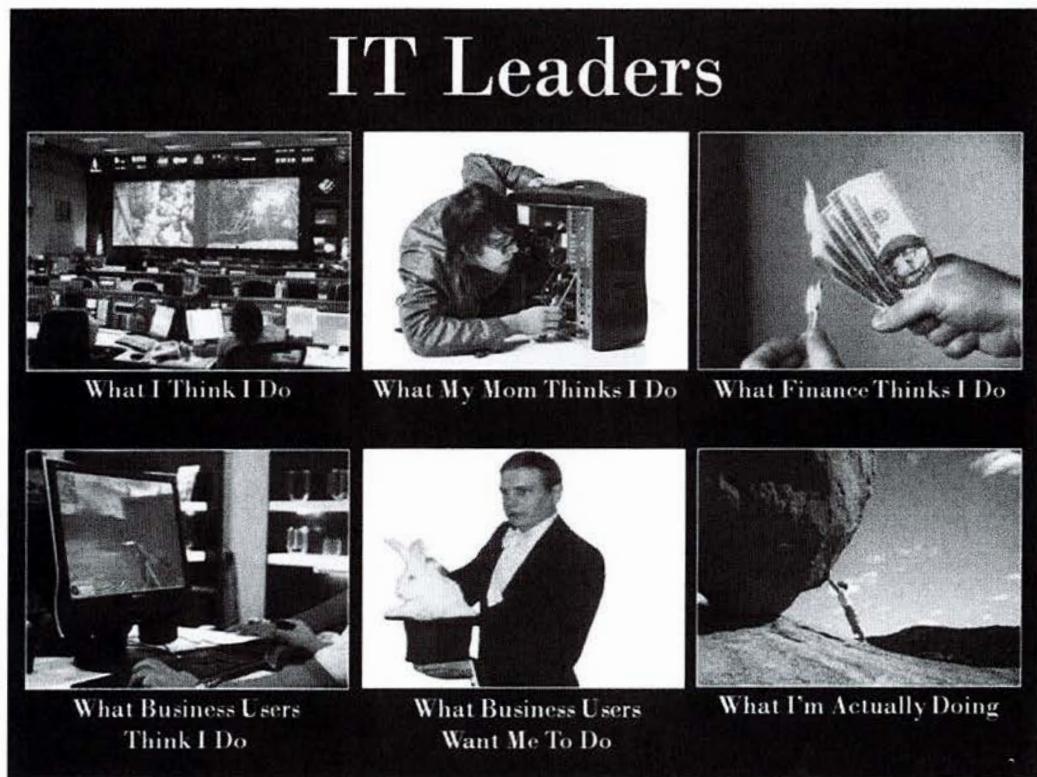

- Met with Johnson Controls representatives on September 25th to discuss possible future replacement of the High School Fire Panel due to obsolescence and unavailability of replace parts (circuit boards and electronic components) – they will prepare proposals. During their visit, they performed an inspection of CTE Building, and were requested to prepare estimates for assuming Maintenance and Service for the installed Honeywell system. Frontier Fire has been our contact for Maintenance and Service on that system, but no agreement is in place for Maintenance Service or required tests and inspections, except for monitoring service.
- A Frontier Fire technician was finally on site on 9/30 to investigate a ground fault alarm on the CTE Building Fire System, which had been an issue for several months. The fault was cleared.
- Johnson Controls has been authorized to proceed with correction of deficiencies identified during their 9/10 inspection (bad auxiliary display in the Clinic, Cresson Riser control valve, and check valve failure at the High School).
- The electronic latch was removed, and card reader disabled at the SE entry to the Middle School, due to security concerns with ability to open the locked door without an access card or key. A conventional latch was reinstalled until a solution to this problem is found.
- Water Samples were taken for the Middle School / High School for the CDPHE Water for Kids lead testing program on 10/11 and 10/22. A total of 44 samples were sent to the lab for analysis.
- The football field sprinkler system was blown out on 10/23 in preparation for winter weather. The backflow preventer was removed previously to prevent freeze damage.
- An annual Health inspection of HS High Risk school facilities (Science & Art Rooms, and CTE Building) is scheduled for Wednesday, November 6th.

Special Statement August 2024

This school year, CCV has experienced an incredible influx of around 40% of families (documented/undocumented) experiencing inadequate nighttime housing, food insecurities, inadequate clothing and basic toiletries for personal hygiene. On August 27, 2024, I attended a meeting at The Aspen Mine Center. The following were in attendance; Mindy Adleff, Krys Arick, Shannon Conely, Lisa Canon and Lisa Noble. The topics discussed included; housing, food, transportation and laundry services.

The Aspen Mine is working on a Grant to fund weekly food backpacks that would provide enough food for a family over the 3 day weekend. This potential project would work in direct relation to CCV school, I have suggested that this be a project for volunteer parents to assist with. The Aspen Mine is also in process of a project titled "Food Recovery Plan" that would work with the casinos and their unused and discarded food items.

Transportation possibilities and coordination with the Teller Senior Coalition would give families the opportunity to obtain a free ride to Divide and Woodland Park on Friday's. I am in the process of verifying a few key details before sharing this information with families.

The Aspen Mine is also willing to start providing laundry vouchers to families affording them the use of the laundromat in Victor.

A monthly drive or "Wish Wednesday" was suggested to aid our students with specific needs, such as clothing and toiletry items. An Amazon account would be created with links to specific families and their needs.

We need to submit our data by October 15th showing students are progressing. CDE only test 3rd, 4th, and 5th grades. Based on the data we provide they may then reconsider Cresson's status and increase it, but we probably won't know until the end of October. Copley stated that one of Cresson's challenges for the data is that the classroom sizes are very small. Copley is putting Cresson data in and working with CDE to personally look at the data since we have such a small population.
